After competing all spring and summer at qualifying competitions, nine NSEF athletes have been selected to represent Nova Scotia at the Canadian Interprovincial Equestrian Championships in Blainville, Quebec this October. Along with the Discipline Coaches and Team NS Chef d'Equipes, here are our athletes:

REINING TEAM



Junior athlete **HANNAH MACQUARRIE** hails from New Glasgow where she is coached year-round by Travis Smith. A recent graduate of North Nova Education Centre, she has been riding for 12 years, the past seven have been spent honing her reining skills. Hannah is thrilled to be representing Team NS in Blainville.



18 year old Junior athlete **NOAH MACASKILL**, from Sydney, has been riding for 12 years and has focused on reining the past 3 1/2 years. Coached by Mona Lewis, he and his six year old horse Chex Nu Doll (aka Weezie), have shown at various competitions in their area, winning such titles as, Sumac Slide NRHA Youth 14-18 champion, Cape Breton Ride N Slide Freestyle Reining, Open Reining and Open Trail champion. Noah and Weezie are proud to ride for team Nova Scotia and hope to do their province justice at the 2014 CIEC.

NEW HELMET RULE GOES INTO EFFECT JANUARY 1ST

In recognition of the need to support member safety, the Nova Scotia Equestrian Federation Board has approved the following changes to Helmet Use Rules, effective January 1, 2015. This rule will apply to Scotia Series competitions, NSEF Trail Ride and Drive, Coaching and Rider Evaluations and any clinic hosted by the NSEF.

HELMET RULE – Effective January 1, 2015 – At all times on the event grounds, persons mounted or driving must wear approved protective headgear (as described below) that is properly fitted and securely fastened by a safety harness that is permanently affixed to the helmet.

The NSEF makes no representation or warranty, expressed or implied, about any approved protective headgear. NSEF cautions riders and drivers that serious injury or death may result despite wearing such headgear, as all equestrian sports involve inherent risk and no protective headgear can protect against all foreseeable injury.

HEADGEAR STANDARDS – Protective headgear must be certified under one of the following standards: ASTM (American Society for Testing Materials), or SEI (Safety Equipment Institute, Inc.); BSI/BS EN (British Standards Institution); EN (European\ Union Standards); or AS/NZS (Australian/New Zealand Standards).

Barbie Lewis acted as Chair of the Meeting, and Valerie McDermott acted as Secretary. Sheila Currie took registration and reported to the Secretary that a quorum for the meeting was present.

Barbie Lewis called the meeting to order at 10:40am.

Quorum: Quorum was met for the meeting.

Agenda: On a motion made by Mary-Clare McLaren and seconded by Sandra Conrad, the agenda was approved as presented. Motion carried.

Minutes: On a motion made by Don Wescott and seconded by Sherri Greenough, the minutes of the annual general meeting of members held on November 18, 2012 were approved. Motion carried.

Business Arising from the Minutes: AGM Committee/Director Reports Distribution period. All committee/director reports were circulated at least three weeks in advance of the 2013 AGM as per the decision made by members at the 2012 AGM. They were included in the Hoofprints Newsletter and sent to members via email notice.

An amendment was made in the Director of Education Report to reflect an increase of Rider Level Examinations that took place in 2013: 60 English and 19 Western.

Financial Statements: The financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2013 as reviewed by Shellnutt Accountants Services were circulated with meeting materials. The statements were reviewed and questions were answered by Heather Myrer and Valerie McDermott. On a motion made by Kim Fortin and seconded by Laurie

Cranton, the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2012 were approved.

New Business:

1. *Proposed By-Law Amendments*

Sandra Conrad came forward on behalf of the NSEF By-Law Review Committee to facilitate the presentation of the proposed By-Law amendments.

Discussion was had with regards to the proposed amendments. Re-wording to Section 36d – Six Directors at Large to read – “To preside for a staggered three-year term. Two Directors-at-Large will be voted in for a three-year term at the annual general meeting”

This year proved to be a positive one for our organization with new initiatives, implementation of Year-One of a Five-Year Strategic plan, membership increase and a full team competing at the Canadian Interprovincial Equestrian Championships.

We developed a Guide for New Riders that will be distributed to various agencies across the province. This is a very exciting guide that will assist parents of new riders in choosing what is best for their child. We are also working with the IWK's Child Safety Link in highlighting horseback riding as one of the activities in which children should be wearing a helmet. We are hoping that our sport will be included as one of the listed activities in all of its promotional material. NSEF is working on a new Social Media Plan that will be considered by the board at its upcoming meeting. Watch for NSEF launching a social media platform in the upcoming months.

NSEF acknowledges and appreciates the funding it has received over the past year from the Province of Nova Scotia via its Amateur Sport Fund and Support4Sport Funding. For the first time, NSEF received non-Canada Games funding that will assist us with sending a team to the Canadian Interprovincial Equestrian Championships and to have various training/athlete identification sessions throughout the winter. Coaches, officials and member clubs are encouraged to contact us for funding opportunities that may also be available through these programs.

We continue to work on our new website and database system. Considerable time was spent this year on implementing the online results input system for Scotia Series. This was a major accomplishment as we are now able to input results online and gives athletes the opportunity to track points from competitions. Members are reminded that with this new system, you can renew membership, shop, and register for programs online. It has proven to be an invaluable service.

As you will read in the Director of Education Report, we have had several successful coaching and official development courses/clinics. We continue to work hard in facilitating the necessary courses and seminars that afford our members the opportunity to advance professionally within the sport of equestrian given the many challenges we face in these economic times.

We were thrilled to be able to provide six deserving young members a \$500 bursary this year. This program continues to be a popular one amongst members. You can find the recipient list in this newsletter. We are equally thrilled to award four members with a newly established Long Term Equestrian Development Bursary of \$250 each.

Competitions continue to play an important role in our athlete development. We continue to provide athletes with a provincial based competition structure in Scotia Series and various competitions throughout the province are EC sanctioned - a positive step forward in providing a safe and friendly competitive environment for our many athletes. The enclosed Competition Report will provide you with detailed information on this topic.

By the time you read this report, we will have sent a full team to the 2014 Canadian Interprovincial Equestrian Championships in Blainville, Quebec. The team is a strong one and we are hoping for great results and a positive experience for all. Check out our Team members in the profile page of the newsletter!

Our Director of Recreation, Suzanne Killen, has worked tirelessly over the past year organizing the 9th Annual NSEF Trail Ride/Drive. This year, we are excited to announce that it will be held in a provincial park - a first for this event. Suzanne and her committed group of volunteers are hoping for a large turn-out. Check out the back page of this newsletter for more information on how to participate in this event!

As initially stated, this past year has been a significant one for the sport of equestrian and equine related activities across the province. The collaborative efforts of volunteers, staff and members have allowed us to continue our progress in delivering the benefits of this sport to our members and to the horse community in general.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our staff - Program Coordinator, Sheila Currie and Membership Coordinator, Joanne Honeygold - for their hard work and enthusiasm as we work diligently to provide you with quality programs and services. I would also like to thank the NSEF Board of Directors, especially President Adrienne Smith, for their direction and support throughout this past year.

I look forward to working with you in 2015.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT (SUBMITTED BY ADRIENNE SMITH)

Summer is turning quickly into fall and my first year as President of NSEF is drawing to a close. It has certainly been a learning curve for me with so much going on provincially and at Equine Canada. I serve on the Provinces Council and the EC Recreation Council and this entails e-mails and conference calls as things unfold at that level. I must give much credit to Barbie Lewis for the years she has dedicated to this position.

- Our coaching programs are progressing nicely starting with a joint coaching symposium in the spring and with on-going development clinics and testing throughout the year for all disciplines. We have had some very impressive clinicians presenting to our coaching body and available to our general membership. NCCP Theory Courses are being offered periodically throughout the year. The Director of Education's report will provide details.
- We are continuing to follow our identified targets/priorities for year one of our five-year strategic plan.

Hunting Season for large game runs from September 8th until December 13th so stay safe and remember your hunters orange!

DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION REPORT (SUBMITTED BY MARY-CLARE McLAREN)

I am pleased to report to the membership of the NSEF, activities that relate to the MDCAC (Multi Discipline Coach Advisory Committee). A number of items may well be reported elsewhere I am sure. Much of what is accomplished is done from our office, Sheila acting as our Provincial Coaching Coordinator for all of the disciplines. This report is lengthy, but as much happens throughout the year - it is a great opportunity to communicate to you! Please note that this report was submitted in early September to meet our publishing deadlines so any updates past September will be reported at a later date!

At the 2014 Equine Canada Awards Gala held in Winnipeg, MB, Equine Canada honored certified coaches who were recognized for excellence. From Nova Scotia the following coaches were awarded the Equine Canada ProChaps National Coaching Certification Program Awards: English Instructor - Maddie West, English Level 2 Coach - Roz Moskovits, and Western Coach 1 - Norma Graham. NSEF members are encouraged to send in nominations for Certified Coaches when the nomination period opens (usually in December). Nominations from members and coaches go forward to the MDCAC committee for selection before being submitted to the National Selection Committee. ProChaps generously sponsors these awards as well as the National Coaching Program. ProChaps offers chaps at a discount to NCCP coaches and they rebate a percentage directly back to the National Coaching Program.

Nationally, the English Rider Level Revisions were completed and released. The revisions provide interested candidates with readily available resources and study guides. These are published on our NSEF Website as well as Equine Canada. The English Levels 9 & 10 were introduced at the end of August.

Nova Scotia is well represented on the National English Coaching Committee with Jill Barker remaining as National Chair. Jill is also a valuable member of the National Competition Review Committee. In addition, Maddie West, Sheila, Jill and myself as well as Gidget Oxner from PEI, are members of the Equine Canada Review Committee for the Instructor Certification Program.

The High School Personal Development Credit, which was launched last fall in Nova Scotia High Schools, has several NSEF members participating. Information on the program is on the website. Participants are encouraged to register early so they benefit from notices on theory courses and other clinics. Nationally the age requirement for the Theory Course has now changed so individuals over 14 can now take the theory course and receive credit.

Our office has the coach database updating well in hand, coaches are now able to check their currency requirements online through their website log in. Members and the general public can check coaches' Certification and Currency on our Find a Coach Page.

The NSEF Coaching Symposium held in April of 2014 was highly successful. The joint discipline symposium was held at the beautiful Deverness Stables in Antigonish. The weekend included the NCCP Clean Sport Module, arena demonstrations, as well some "networking" discussion.

In addition to the Coach Symposium, NSEF also hosted two

Analyze Performance Clinics through the year. In May, we hosted the Improve Your Eye Clinic in Halifax with Jill Barker. In August, we hosted the NCCP Reining Analyze Performance clinic with Wendy Johnston of Alberta. Many thanks to those who participated and especially our demonstration riders. In addition to the Clinic, both Western Intermediate Rider Evaluations and a Western Competition Coach Specialist Pilot Evaluation were held in August.

We continue to actively promote coaching certification to coaches in the province not only through the usual channels of NSEF communications but through personal contact as well. Although a September date had been reserved for an English Coach Evaluation, it did not materialize so we are now seeking expressions of interest from coach candidates for a future evaluation date.

There has been an increase in interest in the use of the Western and English P'tit Trot program as well as the Learn to Ride and Learn to Drive Programs. The manuals for all of these programs are available through the NSEF Office. Several summer camps are using either the P'tit Trot and/or Learn to Ride Programs for their equestrian camp programming.

COMPETITION DIRECTOR'S REPORT (SUBMITTED BY SANDRA CONRAD)

PROVINCIAL OFFICIALS PROGRAM (POP)

The listing of Officials is on the NSEF website and we now have officials accredited in many disciplines to support our competitions. Participants from the POP program are asked to continue to send in information on continuing training they have completed to keep their files up to date. The NSEF Officials Program needs to be recognized by EC. This has been requested in the past and we need to move forward to be able to have endorsements from EC. OEF, HCBC are recognized and our program is equal to and of great quality.

COMPETITION/OFFICIALS CLINICS

NSEF hosted a POP Module 1 clinic in June in Truro. This module is a mandatory module for all POP officials and covers general officiating items including expectations of officials, rules, contracts, dealing with competitors and organizing committees. The clinic was very successful and was well received by participants, whose experience ranged from years of horsemanship experience, coaches, parents and general interest horse folks. This Module was offered as an intense one day seminar with all receiving recognition for their attendance and interest in POP.

The NCCP Reining Analyze Performance Clinic in August was a great clinic for athletes, coaches and officials. Part of the clinic was spent discussing and watching videos of what the judges were looking for and the scoring standards for Reining.

SCOTIA SERIES

The Scotia Series Rules/safety regulations were updated again for 2014. A new system for submitting results was developed this year. Once completed, it will allow for faster entry of results onto the NSEF website so competitors next summer will be able to check their scores earlier in the competition season for any point concerns. Results for the Scotia Series are available on the NSEF Website. We anticipate 11 (plus one cancelled) Scotia Series Competitions by the end of the season this year.

However, there has been a decline in the number of organizers enlisting in the Scotia Series. This is disappointing. We have contacted them to set up information sessions to resolve any issues that are affecting this great opportunity for the NSEF recreational - competitive member.

In lieu of these competitions, the future of a Provincial Championship will need to be reviewed.

The NSEF needs to have a program that can support these members who lack the opportunities to compete in the Scotia Series, but yet be recognized for their competitive achievements.

EC COMPETITIONS

By the end of the competition season, 17 Equine Canada Competitions will be held in Nova Scotia. Of those the breakdown of the Equine Canada competitions will be: 6 Bronze, 2 Silver, 9 Gold. In addition to the 17 competitions one other EC competition was offered but cancelled.

Community Award Nominations

The Community Awards presented at the NSEF Awards Reception are nominated by NSEF Members. The community awards recognize individuals who contribute to equestrian sport in Nova Scotia including recreational and competitive sport. The awards include NSEF Volunteer of the Year Award, NSEF Sponsor of the Year Award, and the NSEF Service Award. SMITH SHARES THOUGHTS ON A SUCCESSFUL YEAR (WRITTEN BY HEATHER MYRER)

Despite living and growing up on a dairy farm, Travis Smith's hunger for horses was what drove him to use money from his first job as a young milker to purchase his first horse.

Travis showed in local circuits before he found his passion for starting colts and reining. Travis credits Jim Durling for this turning point in his horse career and still greatly values Jim's input. Over the next few years, Travis developed from a green Reiner to open competitor, enjoying the thrill of showing Reiners. He also quickly earned a reputation as the "go to guy."

During this period, Travis attended the Nova Scotia Agricultural College and earned a Diploma in Enterprise Management-Equine, as well as a Bachelor of Science (Agriculture) Major in Agricultural Business.

More recently, Travis is fulfilling his dream of running a successful equine business. TS Performances Horses, situated at Sumac Farms in Pictou, consists of what he enjoys most – training horses and helping equine enthusiasts learn more about horses!

Travis took time out of his busy schedule to "chat" with me about his past year and his goals for the future. Here is what he had to say:

HM: 2014 seems to have been a significant year for you as a coach and trainer. What goals have you set for yourself to make this happen?

TS: Yes, it has been a successful year as a trainer winning the Codiac Reiners Derby and several Open classes. However, I'm even more proud of the accomplishments of my students! They have had an awesome year bringing home championships in Non Pro, Limited Open, Rookie, and Green Rider classes! I think the most important goals that have made this happen are short term ones focusing on slowly improving our horses and ourselves as riders. I always focus on improving performance piece by piece rather than thinking about the end result!

HM: Your business, TS Performance Horses, has built a great reputation for itself. What can you tell me about how this business has grown over the past several years? Where do you see it five years from now?

TS: First off, I'm very fortunate to be a part of Sumac Farms, one of the leading reining facilities in the Maritimes. The support I receive from the farm and everyone here has allowed my business to grow the way it has. My reputation as a trainer who is honest with customers and adjusts my program to fit each horse has allowed my training program to really thrive. I have been lucky to get a wide variety of great horses in for training from reiners to hunters and jumpers. My coaching program is really starting to build momentum now! Looking forward this is where I would like to keep expanding and help new and existing reining



enthusiasts move up through the reining ranks!

HM: You will be the first Western Coach in Nova Scotia to be certified under the new NCCP Coach Program as a Competition Coach Specialist, congratulations on that accomplishment. Tell me how you felt the process was to becoming certified and what you might say to others to have them become certified.

TS: Thank you! At first the process can be overwhelming and slightly complicated! However, there are some great people in the coaching program who are willing to help. As the new program becomes more established I'm sure it will become an easier process. At this point everyone is learning! My advice to those interested in becoming certified would be to talk to someone who has experienced the new program first hand. Their experience will be invaluable!

HM: You are the Reining Coach for Team NS traveling to Blainville, Quebec this October. Please tell me about your experience so far and what your goals are for the team.

TS: So far it has been a learning curve for everyone since this competition context is very different than our National Reining Horse Association (NRHA) competitions. However, we now have a more than capable team of three to represent us in Blainville! Our goals will be to represent Nova Scotia to the best of our ability and learn from our experience to be able to help make improvements towards Team Nova Scotia next year. We're also going to have fun doing it too. GO TEAM NS!!

HM: From your viewpoint, where do our reining athletes here in Nova Scotia fare on the competition scene? What are some of the challenges NS athletes face in "making it" in this sport? Where do you see yourself in helping athletes overcome these challenges?

TS: Our reining athletes fare quite well on the competition scene! We have high caliber horses and riders too. Results from away competitions have proven this, such as Mona Lewis just last weekend winning the Limited Open in Blainville! Probably one of the largest challenges NS athletes face is footing. Far too often when I travel for clinics and lessons we cannot train the sliding stop because many facilities lack footing appropriate for sliding. I think education about footing will help, as well as knowledge on where facilities with good footing are located!

HM: Thanks Travis for your time, in closing, what advice do you have for NS coaches and athletes as they prepare themselves for winter training and upcoming competitions?

TS: Keep riding, get a good pair of long johns and lots of toe warmers!

FUNDING AND RECOGNITION PROGRAMS FOR MEMBERS

NSEF members have opportunity to access various funding and recognition programs throughout the year. Each program has its own deadline and most are available to apply online. The following is a summary of such programs accompanied by the submission deadlines.

RECOGNITION PROGRAMS

NSEF Community Awards

Deserving individuals are recognized at the NSEF Awards Reception in the categories of Volunteer of the Year, Service Award and Sponsor of the Year. Deadline to nominate is October 24th. Nomination form can be found on page 6.

NSEF Youth Sportsmanship Award

Scotia Series Competition Organizers and Officials are invited to nominate competitors for the Youth Sportsmanship Award. Detailed formation on the nomination process can be found in the Scotia Series Organizers Handbook on the NSEF website.

NSEF Long Term Equestrian Development (LTED) Bursary

To help support Nova Scotia equestrians of all disciplines, the NSEF has created a Long-Term Equestrian Development Bursary Program from which bursaries will be awarded annually to those individuals who best demonstrate their continuing commitment towards skill development. Up to four awards of \$250 each will be given out yearly to active NSEF members who exemplify a commitment to personal Long-Term Equestrian Development (LTED). The money from this bursary program can be used towards Riding lessons (with a current NCCP certified Coach), Training fees, Competition fees, Continuing education (e.g. clinics), or other activities that will assist in the achievement of long-term equestrian objectives. Applications and criteria can be found on the NSEF website (www.horsenovascotia.ca/Education-NSEF-Bursary). Deadline for submission to the NSEF is March 1st.

NSEF Youth Educational Bursary Program

The NSEF Educational Bursary Program is a financial Bursary funded by the NSEF to assist members attending a post-secondary educational institution. Up to six awards of \$500 each will be given out yearly to active NSEF members who exemplify the objectives of the NSEF. The bursaries will be applied towards post-secondary expenses at a recognized Educational Institute. It shall be applied towards full-time studies only. A candidate may only receive this Bursary once in their lifetime. However, an unsuccessful candidate may re-apply. Applications and criteria can be found on the NSEF website (www.horsenovascotia.ca/Education-NSEF-Bursary). Deadline for submission to the NSEF is May 1st.

Equine Canada ProChaps National Coaching Awards

Members are encouraged to nominate their Equine Canada Certified Coach/Instructor during the nomination period (usually December) to recognize outstanding coaches. Nomination criteria will be communicated to members when they become available from EC.

FUNDING PROGRAMS

Sport Chek Athlete of the Month Award is presented to deserving male and female athletes on a monthly basis for an outstanding event performance or series of performances.

Only those performances that take place during the month of nomination will be considered. More information on the criteria and a copy of the nomination form can be found on the Sport Nova Scotia website www.sportnovascotia.ca under About Us, then Member Programs, then Award Programs. Deadline for submission to the NSEF is the 4th day of each month.

Coach and Official Funding

Individual Certified Coaches and Officials can apply on a monthly basis for certification and training initiatives. Coaches must be a fully certified and active competition coach (or completed the old level 2) and generally are not funded for travelling to events with athletes. Coaches and Officials will be supported based on the quality of their initiative and their ability to assist the Nova Scotia sport system at all levels and be in good standing with NSEF. Deadline for submission to the NSEF is the 13th day of each month.

Athlete Funding

Funding for athletes is results-based and must meet the pre-determined criteria developed by the Support4Sport Program partners. These criteria are currently used to determine high-performance athlete funding in Nova Scotia and is further explained on the Sport Nova Scotia website at www.sportnovascotia.ca. Athletes are asked to review the Tier Chart on this website to ensure eligibility prior to applying.

Athletes can apply at any time. Applications must be completed and submitted by the applicant, and endorsed by NSEF, by the 13th of the month to be reviewed by the Support4Sport Committee at the end of the month.

NS Amateur Sport Fund Manulife Community Sport Grant

 This funding supports projects that are intended to increase sustainable, quality, participation sport programs. This may include new programming or the expansion of existing programs. NSEF clubs are welcome to submit an application twice annually. Deadline for submission to the NSEF is the 24th day of January and July.

Support4Sport Canada Games Sport Equipment Grant

 The Support4Sport Canada Games Sport Equipment Fund was made possible by a \$1 million contribution from the Support4Sport program, as well as a contribution of over \$600,000 from the Halifax 2011 Canada Games Host Society. The Support4Sport Canada Games Sport Equipment Fund is designed to support community sport organizations in their efforts to increase participation in sport. The fund will support projects that are intended to increase sustainable, quality, participation-based sport programs by helping to offset the cost of sport equipment. This may include new programs or the expansion of existing programs
